## From our Minister

Much of this congregational year our Sunday services and other events have focused on stories: our own stories, the story of our congregational history, stories from other people and faith traditions. And we have explored lessons from these stories through theater, music, parables retold, and sharing our own stories with each other. Truly, as the English author Pullman asserts, “After nourishment, shelter and companionship, stores are the thing we need most in the world”. Perhaps most especially during difficult times and liminal times, we need to be reminded of old stories, and at the same time, create new ones with and for each other.

I’ve been a long-time student of research, books, and all things related to the study of what makes a good life. My hope since entering professional ministry has been to help congregations cultivate relationships within and beyond the physical walls of it’s buildings because I agree with filmmaker and author Tahir Shah who said “Stories are a communal currency of humanity”. I’m convinced that in sharing stories with one another we nurture the connections we need for a good life.

As I prepare to close the chapter of my ministry with you, and you prepare to open a new chapter of possibility, we navigate a time of leaving and new beginnings. Let us relish moments of vulnerability, gatherings of celebration, and opportunities to face uncertainty together. How fortunate we are to share the next five months of story telling and creating!

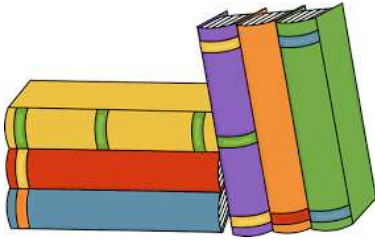

Kathleen is an exceptional minister.

What is certain about UUCD? We have a very generous financial community. We make space and support members who have a passion to share with this community; chair yoga, Death Buffet, Communications task force, fund raising through our annual auction just to name a few.

We also have an awkward truth, to steal a phrase from Rev. O'Sullivan. We have the uncertainty of leadership. The Nominating Committee struggles to find good candidates to fill open leadership roles. Core committees, such as Sunday Services, Buildings and Grounds, and Social Action are in need of passionate and committed members.

Meanwhile, the sexuality education these kids are receiving is vital and life-giving. I want to heartily thank volunteers Lisa Horton, Sequoia Lowe, Julie Tramontana, Jacqui Kaplan, David Parr, Keith Henderson, and Jeff Asher for their faithful work on these programs.

Folk singer/songwriter Lui Collins has been performing, writing and recording for over 40 years, earning international acclaim for her music. Her repertoire, accompanied on tenor ukulele and banjo, ranges from original and traditional folk songs and American standards to bossa nova in the original Brazilian Portuguese. She’s made 16 CDs, performed on others’ projects, and shared the stage with such folk-world notables as Tom Rush, Bonnie Raitt, and Stan Rogers.

Lui has been hailed by the Boston Herald as a “folksinger for our times” and by the Boston Globe as “one of New England’s first and brightest stars.” She was voted third most popular performer at the Champlain Valley Festival in 1992, along with Pete Seeger and French Canadian band La Bottine Souriante. Renowned guitarist Dave van Ronk called her “one of the best guitarist-arrangers I have heard in years,” and Canadian folk icon Stan Rogers quipped, “Lui sings my songs better than I do!”

Both solo and with Anand accompanying her, Lui’s concerts are intimate affairs. She interlaces her songs with stories about their background, her life, the weather – like a conversation with an old friend...with music.

## Notes on Two Hundred Years (and More)

This month's article is adapted from the "Welcome" given by this writer at the bicentennial celebration service of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Danbury, Connecticut, (UUCD) on Sunday morning, October 16, 2022.

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We are here on a very special Sunday. Today we formally mark the 200th anniversary of this church, organized in the Great Plain district of Danbury on December 9, 1822, as the First Universalist Society. This means two centuries of continuous service to the Danbury and for a time the Ridgefield and West Redding communities. In fact we are celebrating 200 years of us, you and me and all those members and friends who came before. We are fortunate to have two talented and energetic members of the clergy now serving us, Rev. Kathleen Rudoff, our consulting minister, and Rev. Sierra-Marie Gerfao, our director of religious education. Prior to their coming approximately sixty clergy have been associated with this congregation. This means an average ministerial tenure of three to four years. There are exceptions but three to four years has been the average. Many were settled ministers. There was at least one circuit rider and others have been part-time. We have had supply, interim, extension, and consulting ministers, a community minister, and a minister as director of religious education.

As members of the clergy have come and gone faithful lay people have persisted through ups and downs, through times good and not so good. Among those faithful members today are Keith and Marie Dupree who signed our membership book 52 years ago, in 1970, and are still active today.

Michael and Barbara Searing signed the book in 1973, both were active members until they moved south a few years ago.

There are those who have been here approximately four decades. Some are with us today in person, perhaps others are present online. Gale Alexander. Members of the Alexander family have been associated with this church since the late 1960s. Bob Bollinger. Donna Lawrence. Janet Swift. Joanne Davidson. Jane Leff. Barbara Myers.

We remember long-time members who have passed on in recent years. Jean Renjilian. Bill McWilliams. Jack and Kathy Charles. Ross Fenster. George and June Volckhausen. Seabury and Eleanor Lyon. Anne Thorpe. Sally Flatau. Henry and Betty Lewis. Philip Hadley. Mejt Glean. Wayne and Rosemary Raulerson.

As I was growing up there were other "pillars" of our church. The Olmstead family. The Taylor family. Francis "Spike" Albert. Frank and Sallie Rollins. Edith Ritton. The Voegele family. Arthur Olson. The Parkhurst family. William Wood. Helen Wood. Harry Lincoln and family. The Don Stone family.

There was Bessie Jackson who with her husband Ralph lived on Hoyt Street near the firehouse. Bessie signed the book in 1908 and was still active in the 1960s. I believe Bessie went with the church when it first moved to West Redding in the early 1970s.

Adelaide Grabert holds a place of honor in our memories, associated with this church for about seventy years, first as assistant organist, then starting in 1897 as organist and choir director. Miss Grabert held these positions for sixty-four years until 1961 when she retired at age ninety.

There were those who went back earlier in the 20th century and to the 19th. Their last names were familiar in both Danbury and the Universalist society and church. Hubbell. Stuckey. Scott. Fanton. Bates. Foster. Dibble. Hurlburt. Ambler. Peck. Andrews. Clark. Ryder. Hopkins. Heath. Treadwell.

There are other members and friends from all eras who are too numerous to name here. Some came and went, others stayed for the long haul. They have been an integral part of our heritage and our memories, the backbone and great strength of this and any free church, the lay people.

## A letter from former member Maggie Hooten

Dear Friends and Family,

It has now been 2 years, 3 months and 27 days since Bill died and left us to figure out how to carry on without him. Because of Covid, we were not able gather together to mark such a momentous event with a celebration of his life and while we kept picking tentative later dates and making plans for a service of some kind, we have now realized this is not what we want to do.

Last week, on the same day and without communicating with each other, Beth and Nathan each called me with the same suggestion: that I might want to create a commemorative book on Bill's life and it immediately felt right. I enjoy writing and Bill was often encouraging me to write a book in my retirement. While I am not sure that this is what he had in mind, I think he would get a kick out of the irony! And I hope it will be a more lasting tribute than a fleeting service.

I am hoping you will be willing to participate in The Bill Project. I would be so very grateful if you would email or snail mail me (or call me and I'll take notes) with any anecdotes, thoughts, quotes, memories, or stories you have about Bill as well as any photos you want to share; anything that might bring that vibrant personality back to life on the page would be wonderful. They can be as many or as few as your memory holds; any length and they don't need to be anything extraordinary or significant - just every day Bill would be delightful. I am also happy to edit for you so no need to fuss over the writing.
